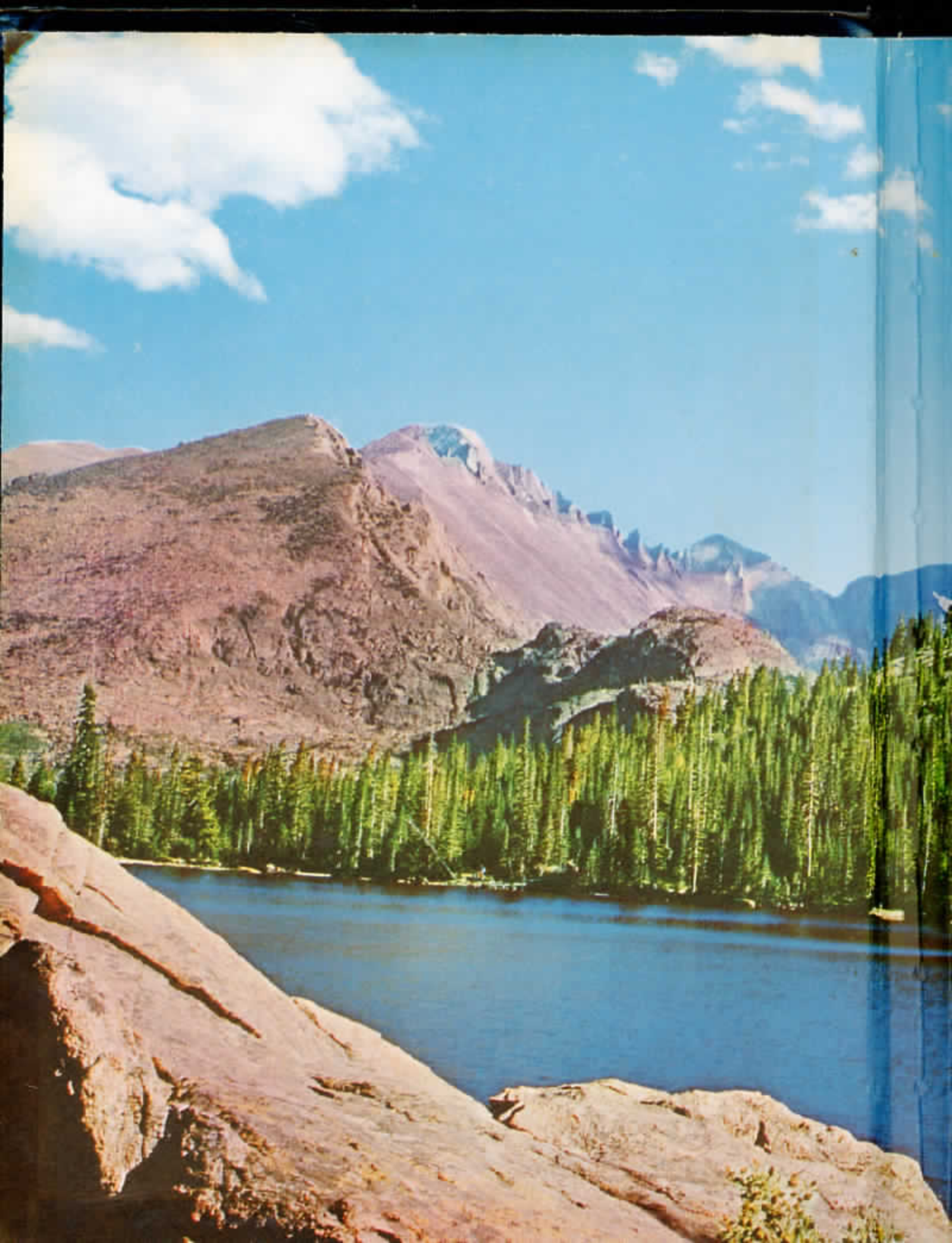

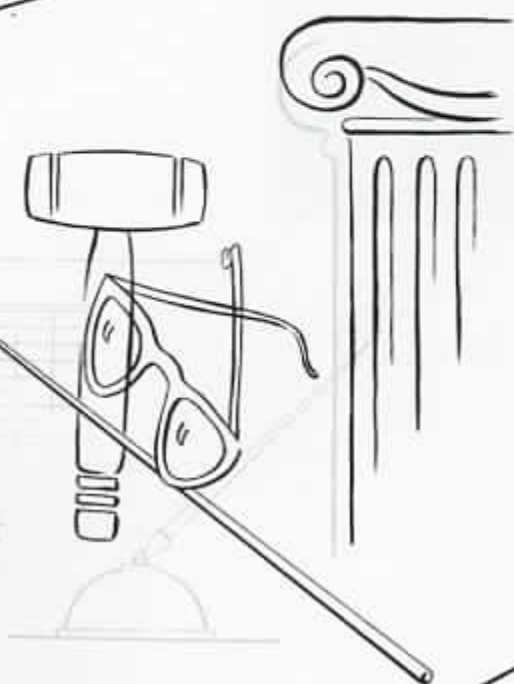

The third year saw two convicts transferring to other prisons. Alice Sondag and Shirley Pulst decided that Sykeston was too rough for them. Mr. Klien served as the third warden of the prison, with Mr. Hanson, Mr. Peterson, and Mr. Ryberg, holding down the guard posts.

The fourth and final year of the Convict's term saw two new "members" up for a "stretch" Richard Kelly and Richard Bernard brought the happy little group back up to 10, which was what the class had started with. Mr. Bernard served as the warden for the final year, assisted by Mr. Peterson, and Mr. Hanson, who kept his charges busy writing.

Following refusal of Commissioner Sondag to grant paroles to this happy, go lucky group, all 10 staged a massive jailbreak on May 22. It succeeded, of course, and as night fell everyone watched the jailbreakers march on into the night.

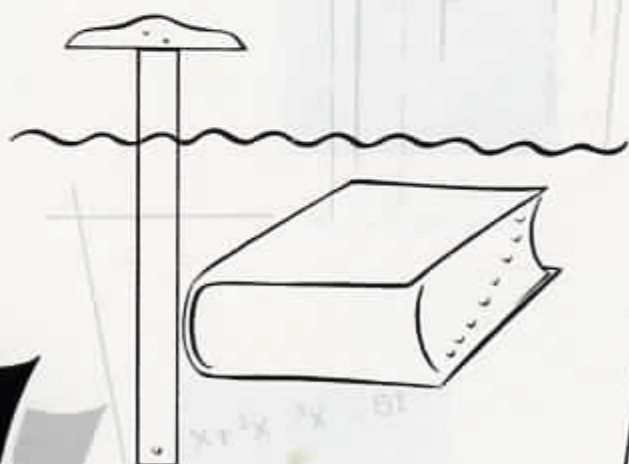

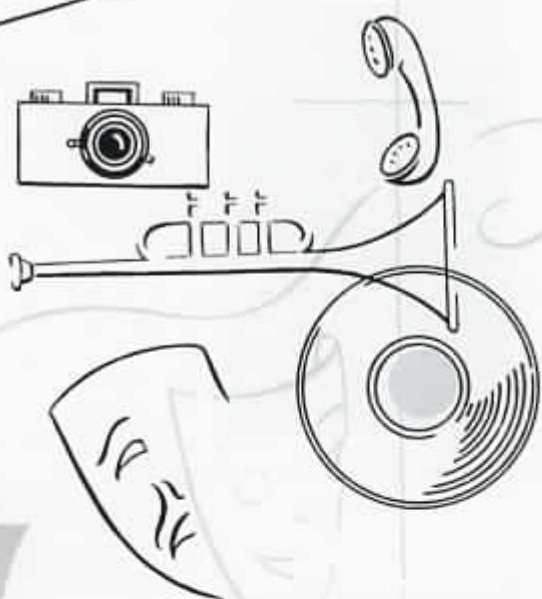

Sykeston High School, led by Arlo Neumiller and Jerry Sondag, completed the 1957-58 season with a very creditable record of 15-4. The Wildcat's 15 victories included first in the Wells County Tourney and third in the District #15 Tourney. The first in the Wells Tourney marked the first time that any Sykeston team had won the event. The Wildcats lost three of their four games to a very big team from Mercer, the team that won the District crown; and the other loss was to Goodrich, the eventual second place winner.

The team's high scorer for the second year in a row was Jerry Sondag, who hooped a total of 391 points for his season's effort. Arlo Neumiller gave him a strong fight for the team scoring championship, however, and ended up with a very respectable 292. Arlo did lead in free throw accuracy, however, as he made 52 while missing only 18 for a .701 pct. The team's highest scoring effort came against Hurdsfield when the Wildcats fired in 80 points, Jerry Sondag making 36 of them. This was not Jerry's biggest night, though, as he collected 37 against Denhoff when we defeated them 74-62. The most field goals that Sykeston could get in a game came against both Hurdsfield and Denhoff as the Wildcats collected 34 in each game. The highest total of free throws was registered against Cathay as the Wildcats made 17 of them. Although statistics were not kept for the whole year, the average from 11 games showed that Sykeston made about 48% of their field goal attempts and 60% of the free throws attempted.

Although four of the starters for this year's team were Seniors, fans of Sykeston don't have to worry about the future of the Wildcats. The "B" squad won 5 of their 8 games, and in the games they lost, two or three main members were missing. Going below the "B's" into the Grade School The St. Elizabeth Midgets had a good season, winning 9 and losing 3.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank Mr. Bernard for his coaching the team this year, and also to Rich Kelly, who was always ready to referee or keep score.

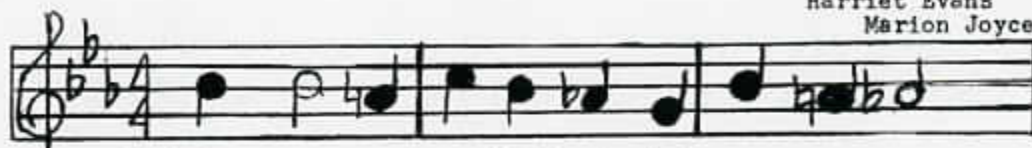
