With the death of my Uncle Vince Busch last Monday, the last of the nine children born to Rosa and Ferd Busch have passed on. His death ends 110 years of a single family occupying the Busch farm in Henrietta Township between Berlin and Grand Rapids.

Vince's Mom and Dad, Rosa and Ferdinand, married at Sinsinawa, Wisconsin (near Dubuque) Feb 28, 1905, and a month later were on their never plowed farm ground in rural North Dakota. They were 21 and 24 years old, with hopes and dreams. There was a place barely begun called "Berlin". Vince said, his Mom and Dad came to their new ground from Edgeley, North Dakota, in 1905, was a 16-year old "teenager" with all of the characteristics well

known to teenagers of any generation.

I spent my first 21 years - and my teen years - in tiny North Dakota towns. The last two years, especially, I've had the privilege of becoming reacquainted with LaMoure. It has been a pleasant experience. There were many nights at Travelers Inn, always a positive experience - those folks deserve and need community support and encouragement. All of those mornings I'd "wake up" at Tesoro and through the ears of this outside stranger I also learned about the community of LaMoure. Centerfield is also a community asset I quite often visited. Assorted community members, met in assorted contexts, came to be of great assistance, always friendly, always helpful. I always felt welcome in your town.

Uncle Vince and Aunt Edith finished their long lives first at Rosewood Court, and then at St. Rose Care Center, and I cannot overemphasize how great an asset these institutions are to the LaMoure area, and those who find themselves in need of the services they provide.

I've always heard that Grandma Rosa Busch was the first to die (August, 1972) at what was then called Colonial Manor, and I could recite a great many positive stories of "little things", as the song goes, that "mean a lot" at LaMoure.

There will be more trips back and forth from suburban St. Paul, but as Vincent is buried, I want to say thank you to everyone who I've gotten to know these past years.
