There were many great thoughts offered by everyone. Here are three, hopefully properly transmitted. About the ability of a single person to change the world: "The Power of One" (yourself) is the greatest power of all. About women's proper role in society: "if the village were on fire, would they only call out the men?". And, finally, about children from Dr. Karl Menninger: "What is done to children they will do to society."
