Ruby Julia Berning was born September 25, 1920, on her grandparents' farm in Hazel Green Township, Wisconsin. Ruby was one of 13 children born to August and Christina Berning. She spent the first 10 years of her life in Dubuque, Iowa. In about 1933, the family returned to their farm near Berlin, North Dakota. She would go through grade school and high school there. Ruby was the first in her family to graduate from high school, and she was the salutatorian. She also received a full scholarship to Jamestown college near her home. Even with all the academic expenses paid, there was not enough money in 1938 for Ruby to get a college education.

After high school, Ruby went to nursing school. She also spent some time in Montana. In 1946, her childhood friend, Miles Horsager, returned from WWII. They soon married and started a family. Later they would take the family name of Miles' mother, Marie Fitzgerald. From North Dakota, they moved briefly to California. They returned to North Dakota for a short time, then moved to Minnesota. In 1955 they purchased 18 acres near Stillwater, MN, and would live there until 1995.


By 1962, Miles and Ruby had 8 children, and the demands of a large family kept her quite busy. Ruby enjoyed gardening, antiquing, music, and reading. Over the years she amassed a large antique collection, and went to many antique shows. She became quite knowledgeable and was sought out for her ability to appraise pieces.

Soon the children were graduating high school and heading out to make lives of their own. Miles and Ruby continued to host Sunday dinners and holidays, help with car repairs, provide assistance with moving, babysit, and generally do all the things that parents do for their children as they grow up. Ruby could be counted on to find the piece of furniure you were looking for. Sometimes she found the thing you didn't even know you needed until you finally had it.

There were some big celebrations of their wedding an inversaries. One was at the Piccadilly, one at the Gasthaus Bavarian Hunter, and one at the Lowel Inn. In 1996, Miles and Ruby celebrated their 50th anniversary with a big party and family reunion.

Soon after, Miles began to show the early symptoms of Alzheimer's disease, and maintenance of the old farmhouse, well, and outbuildings was too much for them. They sold the farm and moved to an apartment in White Bear Lake, where Ruby would live until she was 94. When Miles' health had deteriorated to the point where he needed to go to Ramsy County Care Center, Ruby visited him twice a day, every day. In 3 or more years, you could sount the number of days she missed on one

Even at 90, Ruby was independent. Her 90th birthday was unther big family celebration and reunion. She continued to live in her own apartment, bake Christmas cookies, make Sunday dinners, come to the weddings of her children and grandchildren, and to the births of her great grandchildren. Finally, at 94, Ruby moved to Ramsey County Care Center. Even though she was on hospice care, her health seemed to stabilize and after a few months of convalescence, she was able to go on outings and come to family holidays. We had her for another year and a half, but still the end seemed to come quickly. We learned on July 3rd that she was ill, and on July 5th her life ended.



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
