The Defense Department said foreign ships would be searched and sunk, if necessary, to enforce the blockade, which will become fully effective in a day or two. Officials said action also would be taken against any aircraft thought to be carrying arms.

Mr. Kennedy said the Navy quarantine meant that "all ships of any kind bound for Cubs, from whatever nation or port, will, if found to contain cargoes of offensive weapons, be turned back." He said the quarantine would be extended to other types of cargoes and carriers, if necessary.

He said the United States did not want war with Russia and called on Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev to halt "this clandestine, reckless and provocative threat" to peace. He said it was Khrushchev's chance to move the world back from "the abyss of destruction."

Missile-Carrying Ship Is Key Target of Navy

WASHINGTON; Oct. 23-A huge Soviet ship sp cially rigged to carry ballistic missiles was discribed by d fense sources Tuesday as a key target of U.S. forces block adding

If it continues on its nor-mal schedule in the face of the Cuba quarantine, these sources said, the Russian vessel should turn up in the Atlantic before long.

It was said to have com-pleted a delivery to Cuba in recent days and to have re-

turned to Russia. The first tests of the blockade were expected long before the special missile transporter could start a re-tural byage to Cuba. But if the prize quarry should cross the Atlantic again, it will be requested to submit to search like other ships and ordered to change course away from Cuba if it is carrying the usual missile cargo.

The Navy is prepared to sink it if necessary to keep it out of Cuba.


